

Take Action on Section 287(g) Agreements in Wisconsin

Want to take action on 287(g) agreements in Wisconsin? Contact your county Sheriff's Office. These agreements are reversible and because Sheriffs are elected positions, public pressure could push them to reverse an active agreement at the county level.

TAKE ACTION! If you live in one of the counties with an active 287(g) agreement, use the template letter below to write your county Sheriff's Office and tell them you oppose 287(g).

I'm writing because I am concerned that the [COUNTY] Sheriff's Office has signed a Section 287(g) agreement with the U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE). Under these agreements, local police officers are emboldened to act as ICE agents, allowing them to investigate immigration status, detain individuals, and begin deportation processes.

I am a [FARMER/RURAL RESIDENT] and I oppose the active 287(g) agreement in our county because Wisconsin agriculture depends heavily on immigrant labor. Fear of deportation harms farmworkers, their families, and rural economies and our community relies on immigrant families as neighbors, church members, and local business supporters. Additionally, 287(g) agreements increase stress and instability for mixed-status families working in agriculture.

The [COUNTY] Sheriff's Office performs vital services for rural communities. The 287(g) agreement redirects officers in a way that leaves gaps in the services they typically provide. 287(g) is also eroding trust between local officers and [COUNTY], undermining public safety. Immigrant families, and those who employ immigrants, may fear reporting crimes or cooperating with law enforcement because of the 287(g) agreement.

287(g) agreements are reversible, so I am calling on Sheriff [NAME] to terminate the 287(g) agreement between ICE and [COUNTY].

I am calling on the [COUNTY] Sheriff's Office to continue operating <u>without</u> a 287(g) agreement and am urging Sheriff [NAME] to <u>not</u> sign a 287(g) agreement in the future.
